Tell Me More About FFA



What is FFA?

"Future Farmers of America" was founded by a group of young farmers back in 1928. Their mission was to prepare future generations for the challenges of feeding a growing population. They taught us that agriculture is more than planting and harvesting-- it's a science, it's a business and it's an art. In 1988 the official name of the organization was changed from "Future Farmers of America" to "The National FFA Organization" to reflect the growing diversity of agriculture. We use the acronym GCFFA for our local chapter.

FFA continues to help the next generation rise up to meet those challenges by helping its members to develop their own unique talents and explore their interests in a broad range of career pathways. So today, we are still the Future Farmers of America. But, we are the Future Biologists, Future Chemists, Future Veterinarians, Future Engineers and Future Entrepreneurs of America, too.

THE FFA MISSION - FFA makes a positive difference in the lives of students by developing their potential for premier leadership, personal growth and career success through agricultural education.

What is the structure of the FFA?

FFA is structured on three levels: local, state and national. FFA programs are funded through sponsorships and private donations from the local, state and national level. The local membership fees includes membership at the state and national level. Members are eligible for programs offered at all levels.



The **Texas FFA Association** operates programs which support the work of local chapters. These programs include membership operations, competitive events, scholarship and awards programs, student leadership operations, annual state convention and statewide trademark licensing.

Does everyone have to raise an animal in FFA?

No, livestock projects are very popular, but there are many options: placement in an agricultural job, internships, experimental work in agri-science, horticultural projects and crop projects are just a few. There are also **Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE)** programs available. An SAE is a project or enterprise that gives members hands-on training and a chance to apply what is learned in the classroom.



Is Western wear a requirement?

Western wear is popular among many FFA members, but is definitely <u>not a requirement</u>. FFA members come with all kinds of styles and interests. What brings FFA members together is a common interest in agriculture, leadership and community service. While working in the Ag Barn, most members wear rubber/waterproof boots and comfortable clothing that is easy to move around in and get dirty. During stock shows, many opt for a dressier look where showmanship and animal behavior are judged.

What's up with blue corduroy jacket?

The blue corduroy jacket was adopted as the official dress after the Fredericktown, Ohio chapter had the blue jackets made for their local chapter in 1933 and came to the National FFA convention wearing them. The delegates at that convention voted to make that the official jacket, and they have been part of the official uniform ever since.



Uniforms are not required to be part of the GCFFA. However, there are some situations where uniforms are required, such as if the member is an officer or attending an official FFA event (excluding livestock shows) or certification class where uniforms are required by the state or national level. The Advisors will inform the members of situations where uniforms are required. Wearing the uniform to monthly member meetings is encouraged!



What is the difference between 4-H and FFA?

We do many of the same things and have lots in common. The 4-H is part of the cooperative extension service and is coordinated by local extension agents through county government and by volunteers. 4-H is not limited to agriculture, but takes in things like family and consumer sciences and other areas as well.







What kind of work is required in raising livestock?

The work involved in raising a barn animal depends on the specific animal type. Overall, animals must be cared for daily, sometimes 2-3 times a day— which includes **feeding**, **bathing**, **medical treatments**, **exercising**, **training and cleaning the living area** of the animal. You will learn how to care for your animal from your Advisors and Ag classes. The rewards you gain from raising your barn animal are priceless.

Fun Facts!

44% of all FFA members are female; women hold approximately 50% of state leadership positions.



As a parent, how much time is expected of me if my child decides to raise

livestock? You can give as little or as much time as you and your student feel is necessary. While the FFA experience is designed for your student, it's helpful to become familiar with the duties and responsibilities that a project entails and be willing to hold your child accountable. The bigger the animal, likely the more family involvement is needed.

How often is the FFA member required to go to the Ag Barn at GHS?

With livestock, you will need to care for your animal **daily**. However, the barn is used by all of GCFFA. In order to help keep the barn clean and free of rodents, bugs, disease, infections, etc., <u>EVERY Monday 4 to 6pm is Barn Clean Up Day</u> and every member with a project at the barn is expected to participate in the Monday cleanings.

GCFFA by the Numbers

In 2016-2017, 60 of our students from schools all over GCISD raised 7 lambs, 6 goats, 14 rabbits, 1 chicken, 6 steers, 25 heifers and 27 pigs!

Offset Cost of Projects

Just like the cost of any other sport or clubs, there's a financial commitment that goes along with the projects of the FFA - livestock and horticulture. In order to offset some of those costs, the Friends of GCFFA hosts fundraisers

throughout the year to help supplement the GCFFA budget.

Purchase Equipment and Supplies

The Friends of GCFFA work in tandem with the Advisors to purchase equipment and supplies not covered by the GCISD Agri-Sciences budget.

Scholarships

FFA members in their senior year are eligible to apply for scholarships. The scholarship amounts vary depending on the amount of money raised for the scholarship fund and the number of FFA members who apply.

FFA Membership

There is a Membership Fee to become an official FFA member, as well as additional costs depending on the extent of the member's involvement. For those members raising animals, there will be costs associated with each animal type, including the purchase of the animal. We've put together a list of expenses, though not exhaustive, based on previous years of experience of raising a show animal for FFA.

FFA Membership fee: \$30.00 per school year/\$25 for Jr Member



- Black skirt Skirt is to be at least knee length, hemmed evenly across the bottom, with a slit no longer than 2 inches above the knee, excluding the kick pleat
- White collared blouse & Official FFA blue scarf (\$10.00 per scarf)
- Black dress shoes with a closed heel and toe (no boots, sandals, open-toed shoes, tennis shoes)
- Black nylon hosiery
- Official FFA jacket zipped to the top. (approx. \$60.00)
- Black Slacks may be appropriate for traveling and outdoor activities.



- Black dress pants (no jeans blue or black, leather, pleather, etc.)
- White dress shirt & Official FFA tie (\$12.50 for tie)
- Black dress shoes with a closed heel and toe. (no boots, sandals, opentoed shoes, tennis shoes)
- Black socks
- Official FFA jacket zipped to the top (approx. \$60.00)

FFA Uniform (Official Dress): Costs will vary depending on specific needs.

There are many factors that can affect the total cost of raising livestock. These lists are meant only to give you and your student a general understanding of the investment that you are about to make. Talk to a FFA member or Friends of GCFFA Member about their experience.

An important note from GCISD Administration about Volunteers AND any parent/adult assisting on a GCISD campus:

ALL parents/adults helping out with GCFFA on the GHS campus or in the Ag Barn (as it is part of the GHS campus) must register as a Volunteer with Grape-vine-Colleyville ISD. You can use this web link to get registered ...it takes less than 1 minute!

If you will be entering the school building during school hours, you will need to buzz in at the door and check in at the front office first. Be prepared to show your government issued ID (driver's license, etc.)

Following GCISD's higher security focus and diligence in following procedure, the Friends of GCFFA are required to request every volunteer be approved prior to en-tering the GHS campus. The Raptor security software being used by all GCISD Schools positively identifies every visitor who enters the campus. This is to ensure the visitor has legitimate business at the school and so that the school has an accu-rate accounting of who is in the building in case of emergency. The system also pro-vides an added security feature that is used to screen visitors against a national sex offender database and other legal processes.
